

Two Saints was originally formed in April 2001 through the merger of the Society of St Dismas (founded in 1962) and St Petroc Housing association (founded in 1972). Their head office is in Fareham although their services are located across the region.

Services include outreach to people who are sleeping rough, supported accommodation (direct access hostels, move-on accommodation, and resettlement flats), day centres, community support, Housing First, mental health support and landlord support services.

New Game Format

Sets Play

This is a new format for some of the EIBA National Tournaments this season. The new format is called "SETS Play" and is being utilised in the Under-18 and Under-25 Singles Competitions as well as in the Open Pairs competition.

Under-18 and Under-25 Singles Competitions:

- Each match consists of two (2) sets of 9 ends with no time limit.
- If at any point in a set, one player is unable to win or draw given the number of ends remaining, the end is won by the opposing player
- If the game is tied after two (2) sets, a "best of three end 'tie breaker'" is played to determine the winner
- If the game is still drawn after three (3) tied ends have been played, then one (1) extra end is played.
- The match tie breaker is decided by the winner of each end, and not the total number of shots won in the three ends.
- Each set is played separately, and the scores from the first set do not carry over to the second set.
- The winner of the toss, prior to the start of the first set can choose to take the mat or give it to their opponent.
- The loser of the toss, prior to the start of the first set, has the option to take the mat or give it to their opponent on the second set
- The jack is respotted if it goes out of play to either side of the rink

Open Pairs

- Each match consists of two (2) sets of 9 ends, with a 3 hour and 30 minute time limit.
- If at any point in a set, one team is unable to win or draw given the number of ends remaining, the end is won by the opposing team
- If the game is tied after two (2) sets, then one additional end is played
- After each completed set each team has the option whether to change positions, however the opposition MUST be informed of the change, and MUST be completed before the jack is cast signalling the start of the next set or extra end.
- The jack is respotted if it goes out of play to either side of the rink

PERU AND BUST.

The Andes are the longest mountain range in the world and run down the western coast of South America for 4500 miles. So what was I, a 79 year old with a triple heart by-pass doing sitting astride a big Suzuki DR 650 Trail bike some 15,000 feet up in the Andes. I was on my latest motorcycle adventure with 6 of my dear friends.



We rode northwards out of Lima towards the Andes along Route 66 the Pan American Highway with me following our tour guide Franco with the other 6 riders close behind.

Our 1st Hotel on the Pacific coast was very good indeed, but during our 17 days in Peru the quality varied as way up in the Northern Andes there are few tourists and we had to make do with what was available. But it was all part of the adventure. The mountain roads and canyons made me feel as though I was 18 yrs old again. Even more to my surprise I found that my stamina, no doubt boosted by huge amounts of adrenalin, was standing up surprisingly well. Riding alone does have its drawbacks as I found out, but this was supposed to be a motorcycle adventure, so falling off and getting lost only added to my memories. Finding yourself on roads devoid of sign posts in a strange country can be rather concerning.

I finished up running low on petrol, then found an Indian lady with enough petrol in her tumbled down house to keep me going. Covering an extra 60 miles as darkness engulfed me on a pot holed road with oncoming traffic finally led me to our hotel for the night. A search party had been sent out for me but I got back before them! On the 12th day I took another tumble, this time on a tarmac road on a sharp right-hand bend on the brow of a small hump in the road. My leg finished up under the bike and wow it did hurt, but I said that I could carry on. It had started to rain and we were riding down hill when the rear brake was needed to slow for the numerous bends that confronted us. After some 75 miles I cried enough and managed to pull over to await our back-up mini bus that was carrying our suit cases etc. My bike was tied onto the trailer and I sat inside, leg up on the rear seats.

The following day was to be a boat trip into the Amazonas that finished up with us in 2 dugout canoes with guides who paddled us silently through the backwaters of the Amazon with butterflies the size of footballs flying around us, monkeys swinging high up

in the trees and even a Sloe sitting motionless in the fork of a tree. My leg by this time was swelling up and most painful making moving around impossible. The boat crew pulled up onto an arinocca tree and hacked off a length of root and whittled out a beautiful walking stick that I now have at home.

The following morning left me with no option but to ask our guide to get me to a hospital. It was a Sunday and the small but well quipped mountain hospital X rayed my leg and informed me that it was broken into 3 pieces. (so I had ridden 75 miles with a broken leg) The Doctor plastered me up and I was wheel-chaired back out to the mini bus, but not before paying the bill that I had to question as it was just £17.00. We had decided to finish off our holiday with 2 days in the centre of Lima. The Hotel Bolivia provided me with a wheel chair so I was mobile now and could make my own way around the City whilst the others set off out to explore. I must say that I much enjoyed my short wheelchair experience out of the Hotel holding up the traffic to get across the road and meeting the locals. The homeward trip entailed 3 separate flights and with me in a wheelchair I was wheeled directly past all the queues and right up to my seat in the aircraft. What a way to travel!

Other than my annual membership fee to Palmerston it was the best £3500 that I have ever spent.

Colchester Indoor Bowls Club

We were in Colchester for a couple of days and, seeing as we had a free afternoon, dropped into Colchester Indoor Bowls Club. Keith, the club manager, kindly showed us around and told us a bit about the club. They have six rinks, a compact bar area, a small restaurant and a bowls shop on site. Originally just three rinks, then an extension was added, which houses the other three rinks, changing rooms and toilet facilities. Annual membership is £120, rink fees are £4 for a two hour game.



Originally run as a members club, it was incorporated as a limited company, after lockdown, and a full-time business Manager appointed, when they realised that membership numbers were dropping and income falling off generally. This has the added advantage of protecting members from legal action, if the club should ever fold.

One of the things the new management identified, was that the summer season was under supported, and that was the easiest area in

which to develop extra income. A number of other changes have been implemented since then, with marketing and other initiatives aimed to increase summer membership and usage.

The directors take an active role in developing business opportunities for the club, while the general committee has been split into smaller groups with responsibility for specific areas of the club's operation. For example; there is a Bowls Committee and a Social Committee, each concentrating on developing the club's activities in those areas. We were interested to see that they have a Bridge Club and a Cribbage Club, as well as organising bingo and quiz nights and even a New Year's Eve party.

They use a commercial system, 'Bowlr', for managing online bookings, and allow bookings on an online monthly basis, with payment by cash or card at the bar. They don't have any volunteer stewards, but payments and rink management is overseen by Keith or the Bar Stewards, which means the club can stay open for longer during the summer season, offering more opportunities for members to bowl, and increasing income from rink fees, without raising prices.

Over all, it was a nice club, with friendly staff and bowlers, who all seemed happy to be there and were willing talk about their club. We would certainly join up, if ever we move up that way.



Ditches, please do not step into the ditches As this breaks off the rubber spikes. One hand on the bank and remove the bowl from the ditch with the other hand.


Chewing Gum, please refrain from chewing gum whilst bowling as gum has been found on the green and is difficult to remove and it damages the carpet.
